The Festival is run to give performers an opportunity to perform in a friendly environment, for them to receive constructive criticism and to give us all an opportunity to enjoy their performance. We recognise the hard work they do along with the dedication of teachers and supporters.

TROPHIES are awarded in most classes and are held by the winners for one year. They must be returned to the Trophy Secretaries by the date requested. Trophies are the responsibility of the winner during that time, any damage incurred should be repaired at their expense and they should be returned in a clean condition. The cost and arranging of engraving (if desired) are also the responsibility of the holder.

Trophies will normally only be awarded where the recipient is in one of the top 3 categories – for categories see page 4.

OTHER TROPHIES are presented at the discretion of the Festival Committee and Adjudicators: Victor Ludorum Shields are awarded for the most meritorious performance in each section of the Festival and the Eardley Kemp and Frederick Ingilby Trophies are presented to musicians showing outstanding promise in this year's Festival. The winners will each receive a cheque from the Friends of the Festival to help them in their studies.

NEW CLASSES: include Recital Classes on all instruments and voice from Grade 4 upwards and a Choir Debut class for primary school choirs.

FESTIVAL CELEBRATION CONCERT: A number of performers, representing all age groups and sections of the Festival, will be invited to perform at this event. This year's chosen charity is the Hull Centre for the Deaf. The provisional date will be confirmed in January. Since 1985 (38 years) the concerts have raised over £14,900 for various charities. Our 2023 concert in aid of Kids raised £401 – thank you to everyone who contributed.

FRIENDS OF THE FESTIVAL

The Friends' Association is a valuable part of the Festival and the income from it helps young people in their musical education. The subscription fee is £15 (minimum) which gives admission to all sessions of the Festival and a copy of the programme.

OUR ADJUDICATORS

<u>LIBBY BURGESS</u> is well-known as a pianist on concert stages across Britain, playing in the country's major halls and festivals, on Radio 3, and on a range of recordings. Equally respected for her programming and curational skills, she is the founding director of New Paths Music which presents two festivals in Beverley each year, and from 2018 to 2022 was Co-Artistic Director with Martin Roscoe of the Beverley Chamber Music Festival.

Libby is both a song specialist and a chamber musician and she is sought after as a vocal coach: the seeds of her love for working with voices were sown as organ scholar at Christ Church, Oxford, and nurtured in postgraduate piano studies at the Royal Academy of Music. Libby was formerly Head of Keyboard at Eton College, is in demand as a speaker and writer, and loves working in outreach contexts that seek to overcome barriers and share the power of music with everyone.

MARTIN WALLINGTON has recently retired from playing the viola with the BBC Philharmonic, after 36 years in the job. A graduate of Chetham's School Of Music and The Royal Northern College of Music, he has enjoyed an exciting and fulfilling career playing in many of the finest concert halls in Europe, North and South America, China and Japan, as well as the BBC Proms and all the major concert venues in the UK.

Martin is hugely committed to his involvement in music education. He regularly advises senior students at the beginning of their professional career, and was for a number of years a Mentor for the BBC Philharmonic/RNCM Professional Access Scheme, where students spend time working alongside their mentor in the professional working environment. He has always had a busy private teaching practice, as well as teaching for a number of years at Manchester University.

Away from music, Martin is a fluent French speaker and loves 'escaping' to France on holiday. A keen walker, he will often be found hiking around the Yorkshire Wolds where he lives with his wife (a cello teacher), 2 huge cats and 2 crazy dogs!

ANGELA ROWLEY is a graduate in German from University College, London and after a period in teaching, began private singing training with, among others, Paul Hamburger, leading to the ARCM and a successful singing career.

Angela has performed throughout the UK and Europe and performs periodically in recital, concert and oratorio. For several years Angela taught singing in a large comprehensive school and later in a Sixth Form College where she formed a choir, assisted in the production of musicals and initiated the development of music in the curriculum for students with both mild and severe learning difficulties.

Angela has a private practice, leads residential workshops and masterclasses and is Musical Director of Eccles Community Choir and co-ordinator and MD of Harmony '96 choir.

In 2019 Angela was a finalist in the Francesca Hanley 'Inspirational Teacher of the Year' awards sponsored by the Musicians' Union.

Angela is a fellow of the Incorporated Society of Musicians and an adjudicator with the British and International Federation of Festivals and is happy to adjudicate online festivals.

<u>RULES</u>

1. ENTRIES:

See the Entry Form for details of how to enter by post or email. It would help us enormously if you could download an entry form and type your entry, rather that handwrite it (especially your email address!).

Entry closing date

Monday 23rd October 2023

Fees are shown for each class within the syllabus. Fees cannot be refunded except where the Festival cancels a class. Payment may be made by BACS, Cheque (payable to "CMCMF") or cash.

2. **ENTRANTS** may perform once only in each class, except for duet and trio classes where they may play more than once as long as they have different partners, or are a bona fide member of two choirs or groups. They may only perform any piece once in any year's festival.

3. DUET & TRIO PARTNERS:

If one partner is unable to compete due to illness or accident, a substitute partner may play or sing, provided that the Secretary has notice of this, at the latest, the day before the class is due to take place. We trust performers and teachers not to take advantage of this rule simply because one partner has not had time to learn the piece, or obtain music in time.

4. AGES:

Performers should calculate their age as at January 15th 2024.

5. GRADES:

Where the grade is given, this is the grade we would expect the performer to have attained. Should they have since progressed to a higher grade but not taken the exam we would expect them to enter the class at the higher grade to ensure we have performances of a similar standard, to make fair competition. For example, a performer who has taken and passed grade 2, is missing out Grade 3 and currently working towards Grade 4, should enter for the Grade 3 class. If they are missing 2 exams and working towards grade 5, they should enter the Grade 4 class.

We realise this puts an onus on the performer and their teacher but trust that we can rely on their integrity.

6. MUSIC for the ADJUDICATOR:

Copies of own choice music must be supplied for the adjudicator on the day of the Festival and should be handed in at the Registration Desk <u>at</u> <u>least 15 minutes</u> before the start of the class. The copy for the adjudicator must be clearly marked with <u>performer's name, class and ballot number</u> (plus the title and composer of the music if this is not clear).

The title and composer of own choice pieces must also be clearly written on the entry card, which should be handed in along with the music, at the Registration Desk, <u>at least 15 minutes</u> before the start of the class

7. ACCOMPANISTS:

Performers are advised to bring their own accompanist if at all possible especially if they choose a complicated piece of music that is not only difficult for the soloist and/or the accompanist, but challenging for the integration of the two, where they need to be able to rehearse with the accompanist. If they have time the Festival's accompanists may allow rehearsals (at a fee).

OWN CHOICE MUSIC for the official accompanist *must* be in the hands of June Pitts 5 Minster Avenue, Beverley, HU17 0NL by Monday 11th December 2023

Music should be clearly marked with the performer's name and class, and any musical markings made clear, especially speed. Accompanists should be provided with an original copy for performance. If you ask to use the official accompanist then you must do so or risk disqualification or an additional charge.

8. AWARDS:

1st, 2nd, and 3rd place certificates will be awarded where appropriate in each class. All performers will receive an adjudication. Awards will be withheld if, in the opinion of the adjudicator, the standard of performance is not high enough.

TROPHIES WILL NORMALLY ONLY BE AWARDED WHERE THE RECIPIENT IS IN ONE OF THE TOP 3 CATEGORIES.

The adjudicator's decision is final.

Communication with the Adjudicator concerning any matters relating to the competition by entrants, teachers or other interested parties is prohibited and may lead to disqualification.

The Committee reserves the right to withhold the presentation of trophies to this year's winners if, as past winners, they have persistently failed to return trophies, in a clean condition, within the set time schedule.

9. RECORDING & PHOTOGRAPHY:

The Festival is bound by copyright law and licensing of performances, hence, during performance or adjudication, the taking of photographs and making of **recordings or videos**, including on a mobile phone, **are strictly prohibited**.

10. TIME LIMITS:

In the own choice classes, maximum time limits will be strictly adhered to. Performers must note that their performance may be stopped if they exceed the limit and they may not be given a mark, only an adjudication. There is no requirement to fill the whole of the allocated time.

11. ALTERATIONS & CANCELLATIONS:

The organisers reserve the right to cancel any classes which have too few entries, or to re-time

any classes or make any alteration as may be necessary for the smooth running of the Festival. In the event of an adjudicator being unavailable the organisers will appoint an accredited substitute. Where any part of the programme has to be postponed or cancelled, we regret we will not be able to refund or credit entry fees.

12. PHOTOCOPYING OF MUSIC:

(a) Photocopying of sheet music is illegal unless you have written permission from the publisher, except as in (b) below.

(b) Adjudicator Copy - A person performing at the Festival may make one copy for the adjudicator provided that the performer has already purchased his/her own copy and that the copy made is retained and destroyed by the Festival

(c) Where the performer requires the services of the official accompanist, they should provide an original copy of the work for performance.

(d) The performer and accompanist should have, with them, original copies (or proof of legal download) of the work for the performance at the Festival.

These rules are set by The Music Publishers Association in conjunction with the British and International Federation of Festivals. Performers finding difficulty in obtaining extra copies should apply to the publishers who are usually very sympathetic in granting permission to copy for a small fee. If you are in any doubt please contact The Music Publishers Association at 103 Kingsway, London WC2B 6QX.

13. PROFESSIONAL STATUS:

The Festival is intended for amateurs. For the purposes of this Festival, an amateur is considered to be one who does not receive more than out of pocket expenses for services rendered in that branch of the art with which the competition is concerned. This rule does not apply to conductors. There is also an exemption for one performer in class 561.

Creating Safer Festivals for Everyone



The Federation and its member Festivals use the following policies and procedures to provide safer festivals for everyone:

- 1. A single, definitive Child Protection Policy adopted by all Federation Festivals.
- 2. One or more designated Festival Safeguarding Officers (FSO) appointed for each Federation Festival:

- 3. Best practice advice in the form of Safe Working Practice leaflet, Festival Child Protection leaflet, and any other guidance produced by the Federation. This advice is supported by support and training for all Festival staff and volunteers. Guidance includes clear reporting procedures for anyone with a concern about a child.
- 4. Appropriate recruitment and induction procedures for all new staff and volunteers responsible for providing safe environments for everyone attending/performing at a Federation Festival
- 5. All Festival personnel wear a badge to identify their roles. All teachers/parents/guardians/carers are asked to report all incidents of any nature to anyone wearing a Festival badge. All reported incidents will be handled in accordance with the Safe Working Practice and Festival Child Protection best practice advice. In addition, we will ensure the availability of a quiet area / room where concerns can be expressed in private.
- 6. For the duration of a Festival all teachers/parents/guardians/carers are responsible for the continuous care and supervision of their own children/pupils. If they are unable to attend personally, they must delegate their responsibilities to an identified adult and ensure that their children/pupils are aware of the identity and name of the person responsible for their care. This includes supervision throughout all Festival venues, practice and changing areas that may be provided. The Festival cannot take any responsibility for property left unattended.
- 7. We do not permit any unauthorised photography at our Federation Festivals. For further information on what is and is not authorised, please contact the Festival Safeguarding Officer or anyone wearing a festival badge. If any child, young person or parent/carer is concerned about any photography or recording taking place at an event, please contact the Festival Safeguarding Officer, who will be pleased to discuss this matter with you.
- 8. Some children and adults with support needs may need help in order to take part. If this is the case, we ask the responsible teachers/parents/guardians/carers to contact the Festival Organisers prior to arrival. The Festival aims to meet these needs wherever possible but must know beforehand in order to prepare support or to advise that help cannot be provided on this occasion.
- 9. The Festival's Child Protection Policy and its approach to Creating Safer Festivals for Everyone are published explicitly in our Syllabus, Programme and Website. By completing and signing the entry form all parents / guardians / carers and teachers of entrants under 18 (or adults of any age who may require additional support) confirm that they give (or have obtained) the necessary consents for the entrants to take part in the Festival. Without consent the entry to the Festival cannot be accepted.

Child Protection Policy Statement

The British and International Federation of Festivals for Music, Dance and Speech (BIFF) works for amateur festivals everywhere to help create thousands of educational performance opportunities for children and young people each year.



The Federation and our member Festivals are committed to ensuring safe environments for children and young people and believe that it is always unacceptable for a child or young person to experience abuse of any kind.

We recognise our responsibility to safeguard the welfare of all children and young people, by a commitment to recommend best practice which protects them.

This policy applies to our Board of Trustees, paid staff, Adjudicator members, volunteers, students or anyone working on behalf of the Federation and our member Festivals. It has been drawn up on the basis of relevant law and guidance that seeks to protect children and young people, and its purpose is to set out the overarching principles that guide our approach.

We recognise that:

- the welfare of the child/young person is paramount
- all children, regardless of age, disability, gender, racial heritage, religious belief, sexual orientation or identity, have the right to equal protection from all types of harm or abuse
- working in partnership with children, young people, their parents, carers and other agencies is essential in promoting young people's welfare.

The purpose of the policy:

- to provide protection for the children and young people who participate in our festivals, including the children of festival members
- to provide staff and volunteers with guidance on procedures they should adopt in the event that they suspect a child or young person may be experiencing, or be at risk of, harm

We will seek to safeguard children and young people by:

- valuing them, listening to and respecting them
- appointing a Federation Head of Safeguarding and, for each festival, at least one Festival Safeguarding Officer
- adopting child protection guidelines through procedures and safe working practice for staff and volunteers
- working within the legislation and guidance that specifically addresses the needs of young performers (specifically, the Children and Young People Acts 1933 and 1963, and the Children (Performance and Activities) (England) Regulations 2014
- adopting a safe and balanced approach to the issue of creating and using photography and images of children and young people at our festivals and in our communications
- recruiting staff and volunteers safely, ensuring all necessary checks are made
- sharing information about child protection and safe working practice with children, parents, staff and volunteers
- sharing information about concerns with agencies who need to know, and involving parents and children appropriately
- providing effective management for staff and volunteers through supervision, support and training.

The Federation will review this policy each year in line with NSPCC guidance or sooner in light of any changes in legislation or guidance.

CHOIR CLASSES

In classes 351 - 356, 361, 362 instruments instead of or as well as the piano may be used, providing all instrumentalists are within the age limit. Conductors and pianists/organists may be either amateur or professional. Conductors must <u>not</u> sing with their choirs. **50 singers maximum.** Please check compliance with rule 6.
