**BIFF MARKING SCHEME:** The British & International Federation of Festivals (BIFF) developed a new marking scheme which we began using in the 2025 Festival. In their own words, 'the aim of the scheme is to promote BIFF's core values –Perform | Educate | Inspire' – through 'praise for achievements; positive and constructive teaching points; honesty; kindness and warmth; encouragement and affirmation'. The full outline of the Descriptors and Criteria can be found on page 4. At Cottingham, we have taken this opportunity to move away from giving a mark for each performance and the written feedback will now show a category (band) but not a specific mark. The adjudicator will still allocate first and second places etc., guided by the criteria.

**TROPHIES:** Trophies are awarded in most classes (see Rule 12) and they must be returned by the date requested ready for the next year's Festival. Trophies are the responsibility of the winner during that time, any damage incurred should be repaired at their expense and they should be returned in a clean condition. The cost and arranging of engraving (if desired) are also the responsibility of the holder.

**OTHER TROPHIES** are presented at the discretion of the Festival Committee and Adjudicators: Victor Ludorum Shields are awarded for the most meritorious performance in each section of the Festival and the Eardley Kemp and Frederick Ingilby Trophies are presented to musicians showing outstanding promise in this year's Festival. The winners will each receive a cheque from the Friends of the Festival to help them in their studies.

**CHANGES for 2026**: following a very tightly packed singing weekend in 2025, we have taken the decision to reduce the number of adult singing classes in this year's syllabus. We have kept the classes which regularly receive the most entries and the own choice (any style) class is now open to all ages. We will keep this under review.

**FESTIVAL CELEBRATION CONCERT** (Saturday 7<sup>th</sup> March 2026): A number of performers, representing all age groups and sections of the Festival, will be invited to perform at this event which will be in support of the a local charity. Since 1985 (40 years) the concerts have raised over £16,300 for various charities. Our 2025 concert in aid of the Downright Special raised £807 – thank you to everyone who contributed.

#### **OUR ADJUDICATORS**

**ANTHONY WILLIAMS** Concert pianist, writer, lecturer, examiner and adjudicator, Anthony Williams studied at the Royal Academy of Music, London and then at Reading University.

Following international competition success, he embarked on a career as a concert pianist and alongside this quickly established an international reputation as a piano teacher and a passionate educator of pianistic musicianship at all ages and levels, giving piano masterclasses, public lecture-recitals and seminars on performance and the art of teaching both in the UK and abroad, including China and Hong Kong. He also coaches on International Summer Schools and Residential Courses.

Anthony has given talks on piano performance for Radio 3 and is author and editor of various publications including The Best of Grade and Fingerprints (Faber), Teaching Notes (ABRSM), EPTA Piano Journal, and the highly acclaimed Piano Teacher's Survival Guide (Faber).

He is an ABRSM examiner (diploma, jazz and classical), educational consultant, and a member of the examiner training and review team. He is also a member of BIFF, Chair of EPTA Europe and President of Chipping Norton Music Festival. He was Head of Keyboard and Instrumental at Radley College, Oxfordshire for 34 years until retiring last summer to focus on his freelance and consultancy work.

**KAY TUCKER** was born in Sheffield, Yorkshire and began studies on the cello at the age of 12, continuing studies at the Guildhall School of Music and Drama.

Her portfolio career has combined teaching and adjudicating with performing as a soloist, chamber musician and orchestral player.

Since 1998, Kay has been in popular demand as an Adjudicator throughout the UK, having worked at well over 200 festivals including the National Festival of Music for Youth.

'Encouragement' is a key word in all aspects of Kay's work and she has great joy in working alongside musicians of all ages, particularly the very young.

Kay's passion for teaching led her to develop an early years strings & general musicianship system known as 'Stringbabies'. Since its inception in 2004, 'Stringbabies' has become well established and accepted as a leading approach in strings teaching (surprisingly to all ages!) and is being delivered throughout the UK and abroad in individual teaching practices, schools and music services.

In 2016, Musicbabies for Recorder was published, being the first adaptation of Stringbabies for a non-stringed instrument.

Kay works in partnership with Victoria College Examinations in delivering a bespoke Stringbabies Award for beginner string players and also with Charanga, who are publishing the violin and cello Stringbabies books on their e-learning platform.

In 2013 and 2014, Stringbabies was shortlisted for the Inaugural Rhinegold Music Teachers Awards for Excellence in music education. In 2014 Kay was also a finalist in the BBC Community Heroes Awards in Education in respect of her work in developing 'Stringbabies'.

Over recent years, Kay worked as a consultant to Trinity Guildhall, selecting and co-selecting repertoire for graded exams and diplomas.

Kay was a Trustee and member of the Executive council of the European String Teacher's Association (ESTA). In 2018 she was presented with the ESTA award for exceptional services, in recognition of her work in initiating the Post Graduate Certificate in string teaching accredited by Chichester University.

In 2009, Kay co-founded Horsham Performers Platform and for 10 years served as Chair, continuing as Co-Chair from 2019.

Kay became an Adjudicator Member of the British and International Federation of Festivals in 1997 and undertook the Post-graduate Certificate in Adjudication in 1999/2000.

**JOHN POWELL** Born in London and educated at the University of Cambridge, John Powell has been involved in music in Manchester for nearly 50 years – initially on the staff at Chetham's and as a member of the BBC Northern Singers, more recently as a freelance conductor, singer and singing teacher. For over 25 years he worked with the National Youth Choir and subsequently taught singing for nine years at the University of York. He has been Musical Director of Tatton Singers in Knutsford since 2005 and also conducts choirs in Bolton and Wigan.

John particularly enjoys preparing singers for special events. Recent major projects have included Walton's Belshazzar's Feast at the Bridgewater Hall, Bernstein's Chichester Psalms at the RNCM and a concert tour of Lithuania. A highlight last year was conducting Monteverdi's spectacular Vespers in Knutsford. He regularly directs Singing Days and workshops as well as the annual CSSM chamber choir summer school.

As a singer John has had a long career in radio choirs and performed a wide range of oratorio, from Monteverdi to Tippett. Recitals have been a key part of his work for several decades – including two performances for The Manchester Mid-day Concerts Society.

As an adjudicator for The British and International Federation of Festivals for over 20 years he greatly enjoys engaging with performers of varied ages and experience and encouraging them to explore and stretch their music-making.

#### **RULES**

#### 1. ENTRIES:

See the Entry Form for details of how to enter by post or email. It would help us enormously if you could download an entry form and type your entry, rather than handwrite it (especially your email address!).

### Entry closing date Monday 27<sup>th</sup> October 2025

Fees are shown for each class within the syllabus. Fees cannot be refunded except where the Festival cancels a class. Payment may be made by BACS, Cheque (payable to "CMCMF") or cash.

2. **ENTRANTS** may perform once only in each class, except for duet and trio classes where they may play more than once as long as they have different partners, or are a bona fide member of two choirs or groups.

#### 3. **AGES**:

Performers should calculate their age as at January 15<sup>th</sup> 2026.

4. **GRADES:** Where the grade is given, this is the grade we would expect the performer to have attained. The piece performed should be at the

standard for that grade or a maximum of 1 grade higher. In pre-Grade 1 classes, the piece chosen must be Grade 1 maximum. A pupil who is missing an exam and working towards a higher grade, should enter at the appropriate higher standard to ensure we have performances of a similar standard, to make fair competition.

We realise this puts an onus on the performer and their teacher but trust that we can rely on their integrity.

Grades are to be assessed as at January 15<sup>th</sup> 2026, not the date of entry.

#### 5. OFFICIAL ACCOMPANISTS:

Performers are advised to bring their own accompanist if at all possible. An official accompanist is available in the instrumental and vocal sections and there is a charge of £5 per performance for this service (non-refundable), payable at the time of entry. For those using the official accompanist, we have introduced a requirement for pieces of Grade 6 difficulty and above, that the performer must arrange and pay for a rehearsal with the official accompanist before the festival. Contact details will be provided. The accompanist will charge a fee of £11.50 for a rehearsal of up to 20 minutes or £17.50 for a rehearsal of up to 30 minutes, depending on the difficulty of the piece to be performed. The fee is

payable directly to the accompanist at the time of the rehearsal. Failure to arrange a rehearsal may result in withdrawal of the service.

Performers playing pieces of below Grade 6 standard may request a rehearsal with the official accompanist, for which the same fees as above would apply. (We cannot guarantee availability, so an early request is recommended.)

Music should be clearly marked with the performer's name and class, and any musical markings made clear, especially speed.

Accompanists should be provided with an original copy for performance. If you ask to use the official accompanist, then you must do so or risk disqualification or an additional charge.

#### 6. CHOICE OF MUSIC &TIME LIMITS:

All music is 'own choice' and maximum time limits must be strictly adhered to. Performers must note, if they exceed the limit they may not be given a category, only an adjudication. There is no requirement to fill the whole of the allocated time. Performers may only perform any piece once in any year's festival.

If the piece was composed with an accompaniment, it must be performed with the accompaniment.

Performers may not perform a piece with which they won the previous year.

#### 7. DUET & TRIO PARTNERS:

If one partner is unable to compete due to illness or accident, a substitute partner may play or sing, provided that the Secretary has notice of this, at the latest, the day before the class is due to take place. We trust performers and teachers not to take advantage of this rule simply because one partner has not had time to learn the piece or obtain music in time.

#### 8. ALTERATIONS & CANCELLATIONS:

The organisers reserve the right to cancel any classes which have too few entries, or to re-time any classes or make any alteration as may be necessary for the smooth running of the Festival. Where a class is cancelled before programming, the entry fee will be returned. In the event of an adjudicator being unavailable the organisers will appoint an accredited substitute. Where any part of the programme has to be postponed or cancelled, we regret we will not be able to refund or credit entry fees.

#### 9. REQUIREMENTS 'ON THE DAY'

Performers should sign in 15 minutes before the assigned start time, as classes may run early. The title and composer of each piece of must be clearly written on the entry card, which should be handed in along with the music for the adjudicator, at the Registration Desk, at least 15 minutes before the start of the class

#### 10. MUSIC for the ADJUDICATOR:

Copies of each piece being performed must be supplied for the adjudicator on the day of the Festival and should be handed in at the Registration Desk <u>at least 15 minutes</u> before the start of the class. The copy for the adjudicator must be clearly marked with <u>performer's name</u>, class and ballot number (plus the title and composer of the music if this is not clear).

#### 11. PHOTOCOPYING OF MUSIC:

- (a) Photocopying of sheet music is illegal unless you have written permission from the publisher, except as in (b) below.
- (b) Adjudicator Copy A person performing at the Festival may make one copy for the adjudicator provided that the performer has already purchased his/her own copy and that the copy made is retained and destroyed by the Festival
- (c) Where the performer requires the services of the official accompanist, a photocopy may be sent in advance, but they should provide an original copy of the work for performance on the day.
- (d) The performer and accompanist should have, with them, original copies (or proof of legal

download) of the work for the performance at the Festival.

These rules are set by The Music Publishers Association in conjunction with the British and International Federation of Festivals. Performers finding difficulty in obtaining extra copies should apply to the publishers who are usually very sympathetic in granting permission to copy for a small fee. If you are in any doubt please contact The Music Publishers Association at 103 Kingsway, London WC2B 6QX.

#### 12. **AWARDS**:

All performers will receive an adjudication and a certificate. 1st, 2nd, and 3rd place certificates will be awarded where appropriate in each class. The Festival has trophies available to award for most classes. Awards will be withheld if, in the opinion of the adjudicator, the standard of performance is not high enough.

#### The adjudicator's decision is final.

Communication with the Adjudicator concerning any matters relating to the competition by entrants, teachers or other interested parties is prohibited and may lead to disqualification.

#### 13. RECORDING & PHOTOGRAPHY:

The Festival is bound by copyright law and licensing of performances, hence, during performance or adjudication, the taking of photographs and making of **recordings or videos**, including on a mobile phone, **are strictly prohibited**.

#### 14. PROFESSIONAL STATUS:

The Festival is intended for amateurs. For the purposes of this Festival, an amateur is considered to be one who does not receive more than out of pocket expenses for services rendered in that branch of the art with which the competition is concerned. This rule does not apply to conductors. There is also an exemption for one performer in class 561.

#### **CHOIR CLASSES**

Accompaniment must be used, unless otherwise stated. Instruments instead of or as well as the piano may be used, providing all instrumentalists are within the age limit. Conductors and pianists/organists may be either amateur or professional. Conductors must <u>not</u> sing with their choirs. **50 singers maximum** 

**SCHOOL CHOIRS OWN CHOICE** (Choirs may enter for only one of classes 351, 352)

**Test**: Two contrasting pieces of the Choir's choice, not to exceed 6 minutes.



# **Creating Safer Festivals for Everyone**





- 1. A single, definitive Child Protection Policy adopted by all Federation Festivals.
- 2. One or more designated Festival Safeguarding Officers (FSO) appointed for each Federation Festival:

- 3. Best practice advice in the form of Safe Working Practice leaflet, Festival Child Protection leaflet, and any other guidance produced by the Federation. This advice is supported by support and training for all Festival staff and volunteers. Guidance includes clear reporting procedures for anyone with a concern about a child.
- 4. Appropriate recruitment and induction procedures for all new staff and volunteers responsible for providing safe environments for everyone attending/performing at a Federation Festival
- 5. All Festival personnel wear a badge to identify their roles. All teachers/parents/guardians/carers are asked to report all incidents of any nature to anyone wearing a Festival badge. All reported incidents will be handled in accordance with the Safe Working Practice and Festival Child Protection best practice advice. In addition, we will ensure the availability of a quiet area / room where concerns can be expressed in private.
- 6. For the duration of a Festival all teachers/parents/guardians/carers are responsible for the continuous care and supervision of their own children/pupils. If they are unable to attend personally, they must delegate their responsibilities to an identified adult and ensure that their children/pupils are aware of the identity and name of the person responsible for their care. This includes supervision throughout all Festival venues, practice and changing areas that may be provided. The Festival cannot take any responsibility for property left unattended.
- 7. We do not permit any unauthorised photography at our Federation Festivals. For further information on what is and is not authorised, please contact the Festival Safeguarding Officer or anyone wearing a festival badge. If any child, young person or parent/carer is concerned about any photography or recording taking place at an event, please contact the Festival Safeguarding Officer, who will be pleased to discuss this matter with you.
- 8. Some children and adults with support needs may need help in order to take part. If this is the case, we ask the responsible teachers/parents/guardians/carers to contact the Festival Organisers prior to arrival. The Festival aims to meet these needs wherever possible but must know beforehand in order to prepare support or to advise that help cannot be provided on this occasion.
- 9. The Festival's Child Protection Policy and its approach to Creating Safer Festivals for Everyone are published explicitly in our Syllabus, Programme and Website. By completing and signing the entry form all parents / guardians / carers and teachers of entrants under 18 (or adults of any age who may require additional support) confirm that they give (or have obtained) the necessary consents for the entrants to take part in the Festival. Without consent the entry to the Festival cannot be accepted.

#### **Child Protection Policy Statement**

The British and International Federation of Festivals for Music, Dance and Speech (BIFF) works for amateur festivals everywhere to help create thousands of educational performance opportunities for children and young people each year.



The Federation and our member Festivals are committed to ensuring safe environments for children and young people and believe that it is always unacceptable for a child or young person to experience abuse of any kind.

We recognise our responsibility to safeguard the welfare of all children and young people, by a commitment to recommend best practice which protects them.

This policy applies to our Board of Trustees, paid staff, Adjudicator members, volunteers, students or anyone working on behalf of the Federation and our member Festivals. It has been drawn up on the basis of relevant law and guidance that seeks to protect children and young people, and its purpose is to set out the overarching principles that guide our approach.

#### We recognise that:

- the welfare of the child/young person is paramount
- all children, regardless of age, disability, gender, racial heritage, religious belief, sexual orientation or identity, have the right to equal protection from all types of harm or abuse
- working in partnership with children, young people, their parents, carers and other agencies is essential in promoting young people's welfare.

#### The purpose of the policy:

- to provide protection for the children and young people who participate in our festivals, including the children of festival members
- to provide staff and volunteers with guidance on procedures they should adopt in the event that they suspect a child or young person may be experiencing, or be at risk of, harm

#### We will seek to safeguard children and young people by:

- valuing them, listening to and respecting them
- appointing a Federation Head of Safeguarding and, for each festival, at least one Festival Safeguarding
   Officer
- adopting child protection guidelines through procedures and safe working practice for staff and volunteers
- working within the legislation and guidance that specifically addresses the needs of young performers (specifically, the Children and Young People Acts 1933 and 1963, and the Children (Performance and Activities) (England) Regulations 2014
- adopting a safe and balanced approach to the issue of creating and using photography and images of children and young people at our festivals and in our communications
- · recruiting staff and volunteers safely, ensuring all necessary checks are made
- sharing information about child protection and safe working practice with children, parents, staff and volunteers
- sharing information about concerns with agencies who need to know, and involving parents and children appropriately
- providing effective management for staff and volunteers through supervision, support and training.
